School's role

A child should be able to go to school and feel safe so that they can achieve their very best.

- Anybody who works or volunteers at The Laurels will be checked by the
 Police (vetted) to make sure they are safe to work with children and
 then trained to safeguard children.
- The school has a Designated Safeguarding Lead, Miss Bull and three
 Deputy Safeguarding Leads who have had extra training to know what to do
 when a concern is brought to them by a parent, child, visitor or staff
 member.
- We will always listen to you and work closely with you if we are concerned
 about your child but, in very rare instances, we may not be able to discuss
 our concern. The school has a safeguarding policy based on the model
 policy from West Sussex County Council which tells you more about when
 we must speak to the police or children's services. Please see our school
 website for the policy or ask for a copy from the school office
- We will help your child to learn about keeping themselves safe. Lessons can
 include healthy eating, anti-bullying, e-safety, road safety, healthy
 relationships, drug and alcohol awareness. As part of these lessons your
 child will be told what to do if they are worried or concerned about their
 safety.

Safeguarding is everyone's responsibility. In these exceptional times we need our community to come together and look after one another. So if you see something or hear something that worries you, please say something.

Trained professionals from police, children's services and health are on hand to offer advice and act where needed. The Integrated Front Door is open Monday-Friday, 9-5pm on 01403 229900. Outside of hours you can make an online referral.

School parent partnership

- Attendance—your child's attendance is monitored daily and significant
 absences are always followed up by the attendance officer, Mr Alderton.
 The school has an attendance policy that you can read on the policies
 page of our website or ask for a copy from the school office.
- The Laurels has clear behaviour rules for the whole school community
 that must be followed to keep everyone safe and happy. We understand
 that children do sometimes fall out and this will be dealt with by a
 member of staff who will listen to the children involved and help resolve
 the situation.
- Bullying —The school takes all cases of bullying very seriously and will
 work with children and families to try and resolve any problems. The
 school has an anti-bullying policy on our website.
- Health and Safety—Everyone at The Laurels has a responsibility to keep adults and children work in a safe environment. The school has a clear health and safety policy which everyone must follow. The school have fully trained first aiders to deal with any accidents and administer medicines in school.
- E-safety The school recognises that technology plays an important roll in the education of or children and is committed to safeguarding children in the virtual world. To support parents, the school shares e-safety information to help keep your children safe both in school and at home.
- Parent conduct policy—to keep children, visitors and staff safe on site, we
 have a parent conduct policy to ensure everyone in the community feels
 safe, valued and protected. This policy is on our website.
